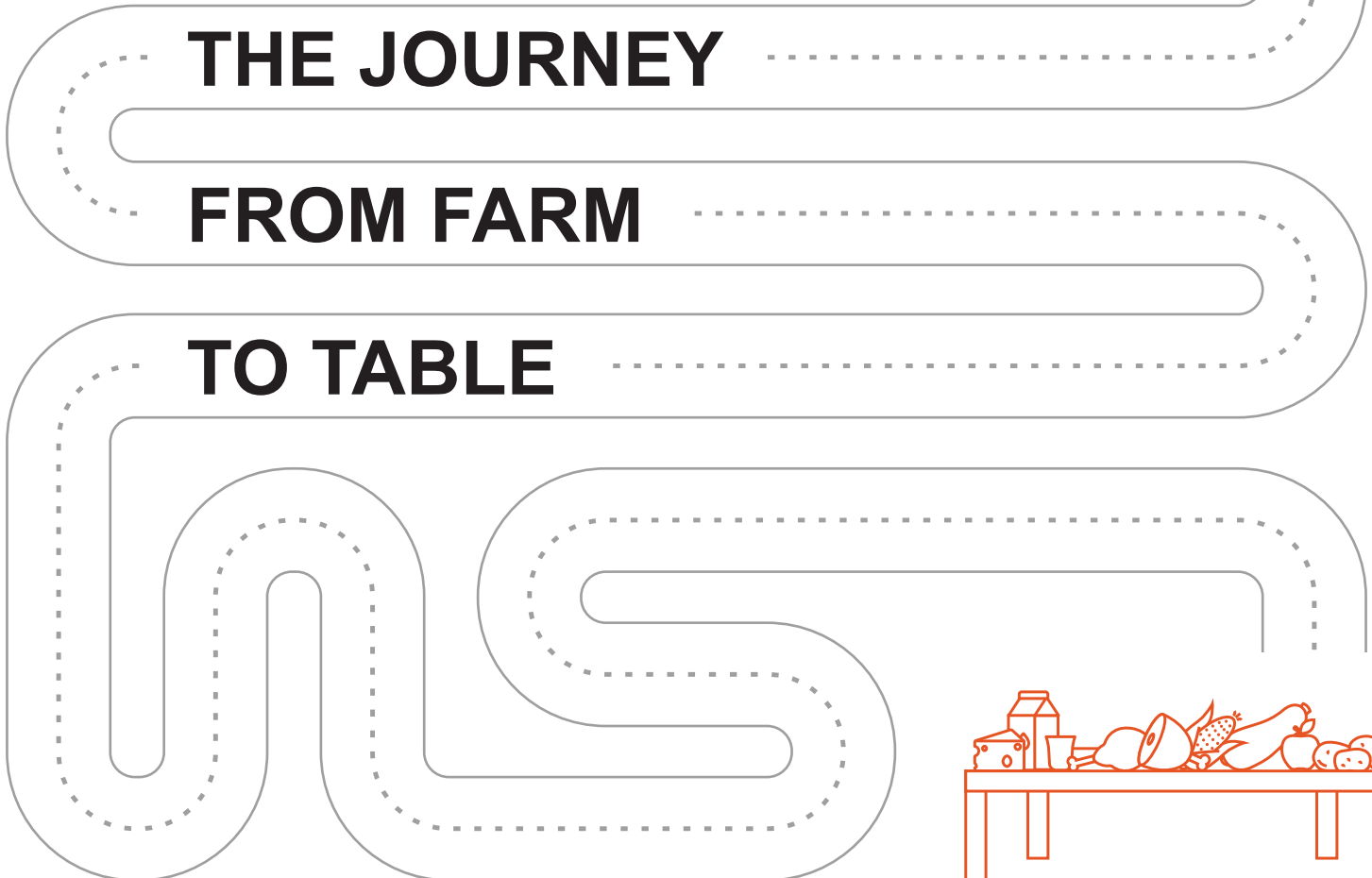

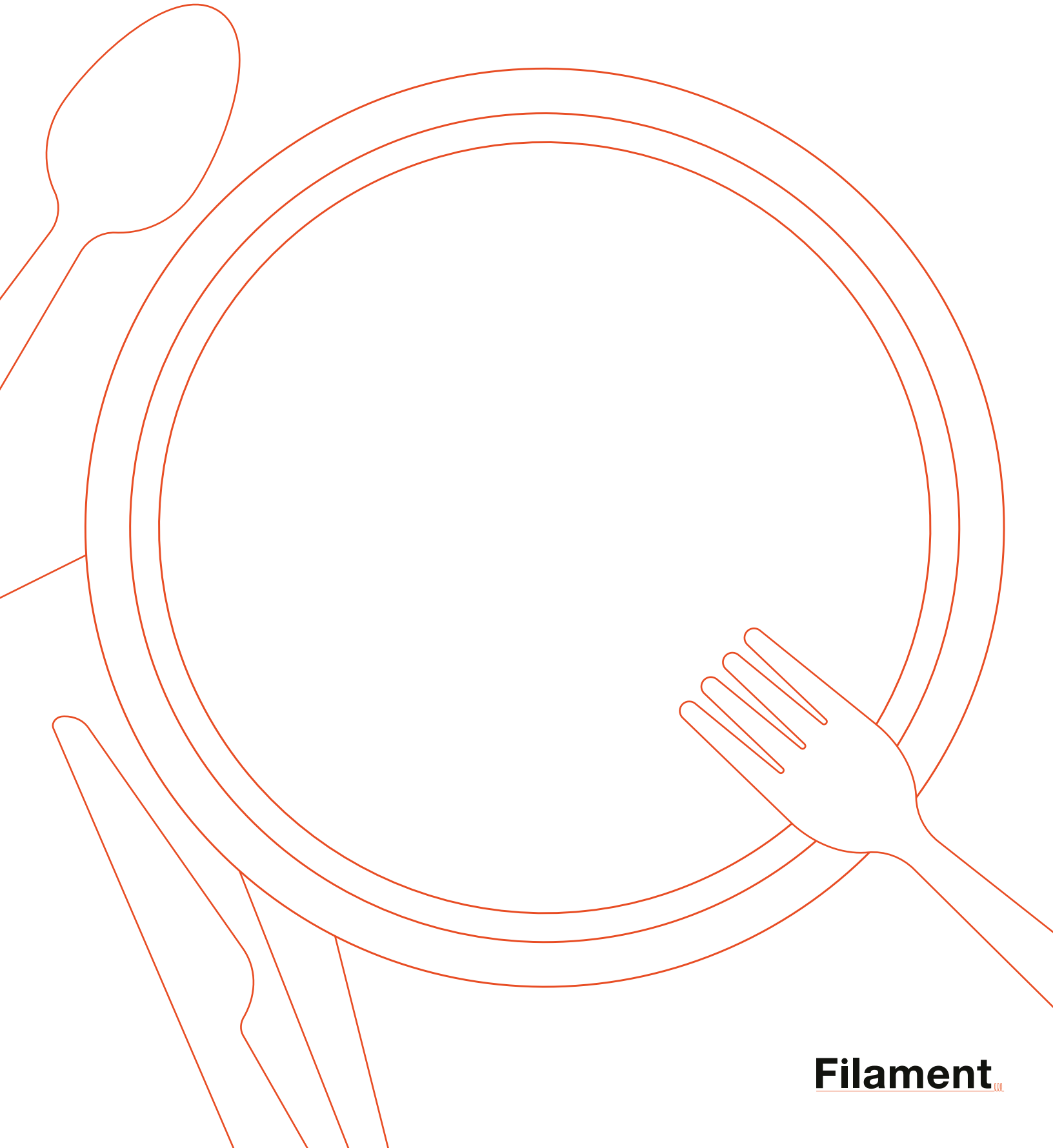

Using only your favorite farm-grown foods, draw the meal you would like to eat for dinner on the plate below.



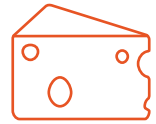


# Match the clue to the food
